A little bit more about...



1 - Gareth Patton, Joint Paediatric Major Trauma Centre Clinical Lead at RACH.

Gareth joined us as Joint Paediatric Major Trauma Centre Clinical Lead, working alongside Gillian Winter as the other Joint Lead, at RACH in March. Originally from Belfast, Gareth moved to Aberdeen to study medicine at the University of Aberdeen (interestingly, in the same class as his current co-lead Gillian), not knowing then that it would be a one-way journey. After graduating, Gareth completed house jobs around the North of Scotland before securing an Emergency Medicine specialty training programme in Tayside. Gareth, having always had a keen interest in paediatrics and MSK pathologies, subsequently went on to complete his subspecialist training in Paediatric Emergency Medicine in the North of Scotland and Yorkhill, Glasgow. Gareth has been a consultant in ARI and RACH for 6 years and is the current lead for the Paediatric Emergency Department. He is an APLS course director and has a keen interest in teaching and training. When not working, Gareth can be found wearing shorts and probably outdoors.



I am Hannah Bedford; paediatric rehabilitation co-ordinator and children's nurse. I previously worked at University Hospitals Southampton in the Paediatric Intensive Care Unit, often caring for major

trauma patients, as well as those under the care of other specialists. I was lucky to be involved with a public education event in road safety and trauma prevention, even making a giant papier-mâché brain (colourful but perhaps not quite accurate!) and using simulation equipment to demonstrate trauma care in the intensive care setting.

I later became a children's cardiac nurse specialist, following patients along their cardiac journeys (at times from antenatal diagnosis through to palliative care), setting up a cardiac transition service and also spent time working with children undergoing cardiac surgeries in Uganda and Jamaica.

After relocating to Elgin, I began working on the children's ward at Raigmore in September 2020 and then joined the major trauma team in April this year. I look forward to working with you all and welcome any opportunities to network with and learn from you.

Nursing, Midwifery and Allied Health Professions (NMAHP) Development Framework for Major Trauma.

The Scottish Trauma Network (STN) are pleased to announce the publication of the Nursing, Midwifery and Allied Health Professions (NMAHP) NMAHP Development Framework for Major Trauma.

The NMAHP Development Framework for Major Trauma will be used by NMAHP practitioners caring for major trauma patients in any in-hospital setting at local, regional and national levels for identifying, planning and supporting learning needs, identifying career pathways and enhancing workforce planning.

This framework is the result of collaborative working between NHS Education for Scotland (NES) and the STN, working closely with NMAHP practitioners and consulting with the STN Education and Workforce group. It is aligned to the already published NES NMAHP Development Framework.

It is currently for registered practitioners at education levels 5-8 with the Healthcare Support Worker element following later in the year, in conjunction with the national HCSW commission.

NHS Highland Trauma Rehab Update



Over the last six months, the Major Trauma Team for NHS Highland has grown exponentially, welcoming a new Clinical Lead, a Paediatric Rehabilitation Co-ordinator and AHPs across Inverness and Caithness. With that in mind, it was acknowledged that there was a need to come together to "re-group". The purpose was to reflect on our progress, acknowledge our challenges and identify future objectives. We dedicated a full working day with a jam-packed agenda.

Our Clinical Development Fellow, Jenny Forteath, presented her recent work with the Tertiary Survey Proforma Initiative. Jenny has been working to create a structured and inclusive proforma to ensure thorough tertiary surveys are conducted on Raigmore Hospital trauma patients and the refore prevent missed injuries. This is in the process of editing and will be trialled and implemented in the coming months.

With a steady upturn in our patient numbers, during the day we acknowledged the significant impact on the workload for all, but in particular, for our Rehab Coordinator. We have identified short-term measures to try to alleviate the workload which we are piloting at present, but we recognised that the sustained increase in moderate and major trauma presenting to Raigmore, as well as patients being repatriated back to Raigmore for rehabilitation, required additional Rehabilitation Co-ordinators for a sustainable service. We reflected on how the addition of two AHPs in Caithness at the beginning of the year has significantly improved communication and handover for patients repatriated to Caithness and will be looking at ways to replicate this model for the other Local Emergency Hospitals in NHS Highland.

MTC Update



Child Brain Injury Trust - App. Launch






